





The Dean's Message



In the first year of the College's second century, the faculty met and deliberated, and tried to see ahead. The College's Self-Study of August 1990 begins:

As we have traditionally conceived of what we are about, our primary mission is to provide a first-rate professional education to students who are preparing to practice law. We also seek to contribute significantly to the body of legal scholarship; render appropriate service to the university, the bench and bar, and the public; and provide educational opportunities for those who want to gain an understanding of the legal system but do not intend to practice law.

The Self-Study continues:

We aspire to become one of the preeminent law schools in the Southeast, on a par with very good state law schools throughout the country. Such a law school would be one in which

△ Students graduate as competent, ethical attorneys, with the skills and knowledge essential to the craft and high standards of professional performance, into jobs commensurate with their talents.

- △ Faculty members fulfill themselves professionally, employing their capabilities in rewarding and productive ways.
- △ Individual and collaborative efforts result in important contributions to the advancement of knowledge about and the improvement of the law, the legal system, and legal education.
- △ There is mutual respect and lively intellectual interchange among a diverse community of faculty members and students, and productive interaction on a regular basis with the rest of the university and members of the larger community, including the bench and bar.
- △ All members of the law school community are treated fairly and humanely, and encouraged to develop confidence in their abilities and a sense of personal worth.

In the fall of the first year of our second century, 160 students took their places in the entering class, chosen from a record 1,222 applicants. One hundred thirty one of them were Tennesseans. They were a diverse group—43 percent female, 13 percent minorities, graduates of 76 undergraduate institutions, drawn from all parts of Tennessee and 18 other states and two foreign countries.

In September a team representing the American Bar Association and the Association of American Law Schools visited the College and wrote a report that praised virtually every aspect of the College's program—the faculty and its strong record of achievement in teaching and scholarship, the students and their dedication to the profession and the school, and the curriculum, with specific mention of the good range of professional skills courses and the fine reputation of the College's pioneering live-client clinic.

Under the auspices of the Moot Court Board, seven teams took the field representing UT in national moot court competitions, and the Trial Team took first place in the NACDL Trial Competition in Santa Fe. The Law Review continued to publish distinguished articles and student work, and laid the plans for an ambitious symposium issue on the Environment and Peace for 1991-92. Chapters of the



National Association of Criminal Defense Lawyers and the National Association for Public Interest Law joined the growing roster of student organizations.

In the first year of its second century, the College conducted a comprehensive review of the curriculum in the Legal Clinic, and instituted changes designed to meet student demand for preparation for practice in a changing professional environment, including new types of clinic experiences in non-litigation settings. Faculty members published casebooks, treatises and supplements in the areas of Torts, Civil Rights, Criminal Law, Criminal Procedure, Secured Transactions, Evidence, Products Liability, and Pre-Trial Litigation (a new entry which was quickly picked up at law schools around the country); bibliographies and updates in the fields of clergy malpractice and the insanity defense; and articles on subjects ranging from the standard of care for veterinarians and the federal tax consequences of joint and mutual wills to Socrates' advocacy in his own defense and the constitutional philosophy of Robert Bork.

The faculty welcomed to its midst Assistant Professor Steven Thorpe, the Library's new Head of Public Service. Permanent WESTLAW and LEXIS training centers were installed in the library for students, faculty, and members of the bench and bar. On football Saturdays in the fall, the College conducted CLE programs on bankruptcy and secured transactions, civil procedure and WESTLAW and LEXIS training. Members of the faculty, individually and working with students, continued the College's active tradition of service to the University and the state, and represented the College in regional and national forums on legal education and law reform. Our Dean, Marilyn Yarbrough, received the annual award of the Society of American Law Teachers for a career devoted to law teaching and service in the public interest, and was appointed to the Pulitzer Prize Board.

In the first year of the College's second century, its alumni joined in supporting its work to an unprecedented extent. The proportion of graduates who contribute financially to the College and its programs through annual giving, major gifts for designated purposes, and deferred gifts, is now the highest of any college on the campus.


In the year to come, the College must search for a dean to replace Marilyn Yarbrough, who has resigned after four years of outstanding service to the College, to accept a distinguished visiting appointment on the faculty at West Virginia, and a new Director of Development and Alumni Affairs to replace Scott Fountain, who has assumed the post of Vice Chancellor at The University of Tennessee Medical School. We must adjust to an eight percent budget reduction, and find a way, while the General Assembly struggles toward a solution to the state's serious fiscal problems, to fund the planning phase of construction of an improved law facility, which the American Bar Association has made a condition of our continued good standing.

These are major challenges, but we'll do fine. Weare blessed with an able faculty and staff and a strong student body, supported by more than 4,000 alumni, and backed by 100 years of tradition.

UNDERGRADUATE SCHOOLS OF THE 1989, 1990, AND 1991 ENTERING STUDENTS

nce again, applications have soared. While the national pool for students applying tolaw schools in the fall of 1991 grew 6.6 percent, the pool of applicants to The University of Tennessee College of Law grew 11 percent. This year, 1222 students applied to the College - 514 Tennessee residents and 708 non-residents. In just two years, the number of out-of-state applicants has increased more than 50 percent. The College is becoming nationally known for the calibre of its faculty and the quality of the education it provides.

As the accompanying charts indicate, the median undergraduate grade point average (UGPA) of the Fall 1991 entering class was 3.39 and the median LSAT score was 36, a figure reflective of the 71st percentile of testtakers. The high UGPA was 4.0 (on a 0.0 to 4.0 scale!) while the high LSAT was 45 (on a scale of 10-48).

The student body is not only well-credentialled, but increasingly diverse. Forty-three percent of the class is female, and 13 percent belong to racial minority groups, both very important factors as we strive to make our profession much more reflective of the world. They hail from 18 states and two foreign countries. Eighty-two percent of the students are Tennesseans. Virginia, Florida, Massachusetts, and North Carolina residents make up most of the balance of the class, while one student hails from the beautiful island of Jamaica, and another comes from mainland China.

This diverse group has graduated from 71 undergraduate institutions: 37 from UT, Knoxville, eight from Middle Tennessee State University, seven from Vanderbilt, seven from East Tennessee State University, and six from UT, Chattanooga. Their chosen fields of study are similar to those in previous classes: 27 have degrees in Political Science, 20 in English, 18 in History, 10 in Accounting, and 10 in Economics. In all, they represent 52 distinct fields of study.

All of this serves to make us a better place and a place about which faculty, staff, alumni, and friends can be justifiably proud. Our recent successes continue to make the College an exciting place for learning and for preparing for our cherished profession.





Law (TAPIL)

Five years ago a group of Harvard Law School graduates began the National Association for Public Interest Law (NAPIL) because they saw a need to support law students interested in public interest law. Today eighty-four law schools belong to NAPIL.

NAPIL, which is based in Washington, D.C., has an administrative staff of four which supervises its fundraising and lobbying efforts. It also acts as an information source for state organizations. NAPIL sponsors a Career Fair and Conference each year so state organizations can get together. Currently NAPIL is lobbying the American Bar Association to free up IOLTA funds (interest earned on attorney retainer fees) to use in loan forgiveness programs.

The Tennessee Association for Public Interest Law (TAPIL) is a dues-paying member of NAPIL. TAPIL votes at NAPIL board meetings on issues and for NAPIL officers. TAPIL shares funds with the national organization and also receives monthly updates on current issues. The University of Tennessee College of Law's TAPIL organization is an active member of the national organization, having attended last year's Washington conference and having provided funds for three law students to work in public interest jobs during the summer of 1990 and four law students during the summer of 1991.

WHAT IS TAPIL?

TAPIL is a non-profit law student organization which exists to promote awareness among University of Tennessee law students of the importance of pursuing public interest job opportunities. TAPIL attempts to serve as an informational resource for the dissemination of current materials pertaining to public interest careers and employment.

TAPIL is not a "political" organization and recognizes all public interest legal organizations which may or may not have a political objective and which deal with environmental concerns, government watchdog groups, public defenders, and prosecutors positions.

TAPIL seeks to remove some of the financial barriers which law students face in their attempts to participate in public interest career opportunities by providing several fellowships for law students and summer clerks in public interest law areas. While TAPIL can't provide for the total amount needed to cover a law student's summer expenses, the fellowships provide enough help to allow law students to accept positions they could not otherwise afford. The University of Tennessee chapter of TAPIL has provided summer fellowships of up to \$2,500 and will continue its efforts as each year funds are raised through various projects.

1990 TAPIL officers were: Mary E. Gasparini (now with the New York City Legal Aid Society), president; Karin E. Clough, vice president; Diane E. Corwin, secretary; Patsy O. Powers, treasurer; J. Davidson Frenchand Elisabeth B. Donnovin, executive committee; and J. Matthew Powers, newsletter editor.

Kelly C. Bryson, Carla G. Fox and Joseph K. Pascale were 1990 fellowship recipients. Wanda L. Adams, Morris A. Landau, Jamie L. Niland, and Cassandra E. Washington were 1991 fellowship recipients. As the following reports show, their experiences were rich and varied.

Kelly Bryson Public Defender's Office (Juvenile Division) Nashville, Tennessee

Before I got my limited license to practice, I acted mainly as an investigator. Most of my investigations included interviewing witnesses and drawing the scenes of the alleged incidents. (You learn the correct vocabulary quickly, the incident is always 'alleged' and it may involve a 'group' but never a 'gang.') Most of my investigations took me to the Nashville housing projects. The most difficult interview I conducted in the projects took place on a hot day. Our client sat on his front porch without a shirt on, and I found that I was faced by a large swastika carved onto his chest.

The most exciting part of the summer was taking my own clients' cases into the courtroom. Many thanks to TAPIL.

Carla Fox NAACP, New York Headquarters New York City, New York

My LDF (Legal Defense Fund) experience was more challenging and rewarding than I can describe. Among other things, I was directly involved in the negotiation and settlement of an employment discrimination action, and participated in the drafting and filing of documents necessary to effectuate an appeal to the Eighth Circuit Court of Appeals in another employment discrimination action.

Along with a host of other legal public interest organizations, LDF is housed in an old twenty-two story building in lower Manhattan, near the World Trade Center. LDF attorneys work in small offices and often share secretarial support staff, in contrast to many private law practices.

During my clerkship, I observed experienced attorneys strategically file appeals with the Supreme Court, lobby for the passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1990, and collaborate with other organizations and cooperating attorneys to maintain a united coalition of civil rights advocates.

Joe Pascale Office of the Comptroller of the Currency New York City, New York

My main function was to respond to letters of inquiry. These letters were sent in from bank officers, attorneys, and other representatives for banks. These letters usually requested the OCC's legalopinion on particular banking practices. I would

research the questions presented and then draft the letters in response for one of the OCC attorneys' signature. Occasionally, I contacted the bank representative over the telephone in order to answer specific questions.

I also attended a Directors' Meeting. In the meeting which I attended, the OCC officers and the directors of a small New England bank were trying to resolve the proper amount of capital which the bank needed to raise in order to avoid becoming insolvent.

The living expenses in New York City are, needless to say, outrageous. An internship which was purely voluntary did not neutralize my expense situation by any means. The \$1000 grant from TAPIL was, without a doubt, a relieving source of funds for me.

Jamie Niland Tennessee Human Rights Commission Knoxville, Tennessee

I spent this past summer working for the Tennessee Human Rights Commission (THRC) in Knoxville. THRC is a state agency whose main purpose is to investigate claims of employment discrimination. Employees who feel they have been discriminated against call or come into the office and discuss their work situation. If there is a possibility that there was discrimination based on certain factors (race, sex, religion, color, creed, etc.), a THRC representative will file a complaint for the employee. The employer will be notified shortly after the complaint is filed and will respond to the allegations. At some point in the future, the case will be assigned to a representative for investigation. After the investigation is completed, the THRC representative will send a letter to the employee and the employer stating whether or not "cause" was found, and the reasons for the decision. Both sides are given the opportunity to respond with additional information, and if no new information is received by THRC, a final determination is made and the case is sent to the main office in Nashville.


I enjoyed working at THRC because I was given more responsibility than is usual in a clerking position. I was given actual cases to investigate, and I completed several investigations during the summer. I completed some of the investigations by conducting telephone interviews with witnesses, and in other cases I sent out interrogatories. I took part in one on-site investigation which consisted of taking depositions from over a dozen witnesses. Some of the witnesses were very cooperative and others were somewhat hostile. Although the Commission is a neutral agency, some of the witnesses were under the impression that we were hired by

Although the Commission is a neutral agency, some of the witnesses were under the impression that we were hired by one side or the other. In other cases, witnesses still employed by the employer under investigation were worried they might lose their jobs by speaking out against the employer. Another hurdle I ran into frequently was the backlog of cases, which made investigations sometimes very difficult. For instance, I had several cases from 1987. These cases were difficult to investigate because many of the witnesses had moved away and could not be found. The time lag was also a problem because some of the witnesses could not remember incidents I was trying to corroborate, and others who did remember claimed they did not.

One of the biggest advantages of working at the Commission was the atmosphere, which was casual, but professional. The attorneys I worked with were always willing to help me and they will be good contacts for the future. Job stress was minimal and the hours were flexible.

Wanda Adams Legal Services of Western Carolina Greenville, South Carolina

I had the great experience of a second summer clerkship with Legal Services of Western Carolina, Greenville, South Carolina. This agency is staffed with 9 attorneys of diverse backgrounds. Being the only summer clerk allowed me the opportunity to assist all the attorneys, and therefore, be exposed to various areas of the law. Legal Services of Western Carolina provides family, consumer, housing, and

social security law services to indigent and low income clients in Greenville and surrounding counties. My duties ranged from drafting pleading to assisting with voir dire.

Public Service agencies such as this require a team effort in order to respond to the needs of the clients as they arise. You can't tell a hysterical battered wife that she must wait for an appointment to get a protection order. I must admit, some days were like a zoo! But I always left the office, although exhausted, with a sense of accomplishment, and proud to be a member of such a dedicated team. The TAPIL fellowship was a tremendous help because, unfortunately, these agencies cannot afford to compete with firms in providing attractive pay for summer clerkships. The fellowship helped me to meet my basic needs such as transportation and meals. I doubt seriously that I would have been able to gain such valuable experience at a large more "traditional" firm. I would strongly recommend a summer clerkship at a legal aid agency. The experience cannot be matched!

Cassandra Washington Rural Legal Services of Tennessee Oak Ridge, Tennessee

This summer, I had the wonderful opportunity to work for Rural Legal Services of Tennessee (RLST) which is located in Oak Ridge. Thanks to the generous fellowship award from TAPIL and matching funds from RLST, my public interest clerking experience was free of financial worries. My first major project was to draft a comment to HUD regarding a pending due process determination it was about to issue. Thanks to my planning and drafting project completed in Professor Glenn Reynolds' Administrative Law class, I was well prepared to write the comment.

On another assignment, I organized data related to OB/GYN access for Medicaid patients. The problem for rural medicaid recipients is that most rural hospitals and doctors do not accept medicaid patients. Therefore a woman in labor must travel to the University of Tennessee Hospital in order to deliver. Some women face at least an hour commute. I had the opportunity to research Consumer Protection issues, draft a divorce complaint for a minor, including a petition for her emancipation, and a myriad of other projects. After my summer at RLST, there is nodoubt I will always have a connection with publicinterest law. Whether it is through donations to an organization like TAPIL (that made my experience a reality) or by accepting pro bono cases, I will find satisfaction in knowing I am helping someone in some capacity.



Morris Landau U.S. Attorney's Office Knoxville, Tennessee

I worked at the U.S. Attorney's Office in the Eastern District of Tennessee. I received a \$1500 Fellowship from TAPIL. My responsibilities were researching issues, particularly in the criminal area. I drafted briefs and did a lot of preparation and final work. The fellowship was extremely helpful because without it I probably would not have had the opportunity to work for the federal government. In addition, I met extremely competent attorneys and made valuable connections. My main responsibilities were researching legal issues, drafting responses to criminal defense motions, as well as research and writing for legal briefs — very practical experience.

BASS, BERRY & SIMS ESTABLISHES FACULTY AWARD AND STUDENT SCHOLARSHIP







first look at the graduate survey for the Class of 1990 indicates it was a good year for job-hunting. Within nine months of graduation, 96 percent of the graduates had accepted employment.* Over 91 percent of those employed were in full-time legal positions.**

One hundred percent of the 13 minority members of the class were employed: four in private law firms; three in federal administrative agencies, two in attorney positions; two as judicial clerks; one as a public defender; another as a law librarian; and the last as the executive director of a social service agency. Nine graduates reported employment in full-time non-legal positions. Of those, one had opted for a return to professional football; two were with the military in Saudi Arabia.

The majority of the class members, like their predecessors, chose private practice. Sixty-four percent of the employed had joined private firms, with over half choosing the "very small firm" with two to ten members. Firms tying for the title of hiring the most students from the Class of 1990 were Heiskell, Donelson, Bearman, Adams, Williams & Kirsch of Memphis and Vinson & Elkins of Houston, each firm hiring three. Heiskell Donelson took the lead later in the year by adding two additional class members, one each in the Chattanooga and Knoxville offices. (See the chart on the accompanying page for complete breakdown of practice areas for law firms, as well as other categories.) Four graduates reported solo practice.

The jump in the figure for public interest employment to eight percent, from the three percent average for the previous five years, resulted from the creation of a state public defender system. Nine graduates accepted positions as assistant public defenders, seven in Tennessee, one in Kentucky and one in Florida.

Twenty-nine percent of the 1990 graduates reported employment in out of state locations, a nine percent increase over the 20 percent average for the last five years. Of the 42 locating out of state, seven went to Texas; five to Virginia and five to D.C. (with the five in the military also categorized as D.C.); four to Georgia; two to Alabama, Kentucky, North Carolina and Florida; with one each to Colorado, Connecticut, Louisiana, Minnesota, Mississippi, New York, Pennsylvania, and West Virginia.

Of the graduates remaining in Tennessee, 23 percent chose a Knoxville location, very near the 25 percent average for the class of the past five years. Though Nashville formerly attracted more graduates than Chattanooga, the trend is for the two cities to draw near the same number, as the 10 percent for both cities in 1990 indicates. The percent choosing Memphis remains in the four to six percent range and appears to approximate the number of students from Memphis in each class.

Slightly over half of the 144 reporting employment included salary information, revealing a range of \$18,500 to \$95,500 and an average annual salary of \$38,652 for all locations. The high figure represented a part law and part administrative job that included an equity position in the company. The low was for a judicial clerkship in another state. See the accompanying chart for the average figures in various Tennessee locations.

Preliminary statistics for June graduates of the Class of 1991 indicated that almost 65 percent had accepted positions by the time of graduation, a figure only slightly lower than the 70 percent average for previous years. As noted above, over half join small firms (2-10 members) that do not hire until after the bar exam, or after the time the results are announced mid-October. By the start of a new calendar year, 85 to 90 percent or more of the new graduates as a rule have been absorbed into the legal profession.

Last year's annual report noted a drop in the number of employers recruiting on campus in 1989-90 to 87 from 105 in 1988-1989. While the number of employers recruiting on campus for 1990-91 remained constant at 87, the pattern of students they wished to interview changed. In Fall 1989, 63 employers asked to see third-year students, while in Fall 1990, the number dropped to 49. A growing trend among all firms appears to be to avoid making hiring decisions in the fall a year before hiring, with a preference to postpone hiring until practice needs are certain. Often when practice needs are recognized, a licensed attorney is needed in a hurry. This means not only that more laterals are likely to be hired but also that the hiring of entry-level attorneys in many instances is postponed until after bar results are announced.





n addition to a collection of books, journals, and microforms, the Law Library continues to provide a wide array of servicestothestudents and faculty of the College of Law. Services available include professional reference help for a total of 71 hours per week, interlibrary loan of materials not held by the library, use of the computer laboratory, and access to computerized database searching services. Students and faculty from other departments within the University, as well as members of the practicing bar and the general public, may also use the resources in the Law Library and are provided with many of these same services.

The past year saw the hiring of a new Head of Public Services. Assistant Professor Steven Thorpe is now responsible for all public service activities, and for the teaching of legal research to the first year law students. In planning for the future of the Law Library, the Faculty Library Advisory Committee recently completed a Twelve-Year Staffing Plan. When this plan is fully implemented, the Law Library user of tomorrow will have the services of a faculty and clerical staff trained to help that user obtain the maximum benefit from the Law Library collections and services.

The five-year comparison chart shows the growth in the Law Library volume and title counts, as well as expenditures to maintain and expand the collection. The 325,801 total volumes represents an 18 percent increase in holdings during the past five years. During that same period acquisitions expenditures have risen by 50 percent to meet the increasing costs for legal materials. Eighty-three percent of the fiscal year (FY) 1990-91 acquisitions expenditures went to maintain the core collection; only five percent was available for the purchase of new titles.

The use of the computer in legal education continues to increase dramatically. Law faculty and students now have unlimited access to the LEXIS, NEXIS, WESTLAW, and selected DIALOG databases. Usage of these databases has increased to over 5,100 hours during FY 1990-91. These databases are available both in the Law Library and through home computers. Both LEXIS and WESTLAW have provided the Law Library with a "Permanent Learning Center". These centers provide equipment and instructional personnel to facilitateoptimal use of the databases. The Law Library also provides access to CALI, a collection of interactive legal instruction programs provided by the Center for Computer-Assisted Legal Instruction.
