

xciting things are happening at the University of Tennessee College of Law.


On September 17, 1994, with many alumni and other distinguished guests present, we broke ground for the law school building. On the same day, at a combined meeting of the Alumni Advisory Council and the Dean's Circle, I announced the College of Law's Cornerstone Campaign.

The plans we have been talking about for years are finally taking shape. The Cornerstone Campaign — part of the University of Tennessee's Campaign for the 21st Century — represents the next major step forward.

The Cornerstone Campaign has the potential to raise the overall quality of everything we do. It has the potential to place us in the forefront of law schools dedicated to the preparation of competent, ethical lawyers for practice. It will enable us to honor the emeritus faculty who trained a generation of fine lawyers, judges and bar leaders for the state. It will put us in a position to turn the Law Library into a resource for lawyers and judges throughout the state. We can build a building that will instill justifiable pride in everyone associated with the school.

Our campaign goal is \$6 million. The major priorities are:

• The Center for Advocacy, dedicated to providing law graduates with the skills and knowledge required to function as effective advocates, well versed in the full range of techniques for dispute resolution and schooled in the exercise of judgment in their use.



- The Center for Entrepreneurial Law, built around a core curriculum in business transactions that orients lawyers to the way successful entrepreneurs think, and the use of their skills to promote good business relationships and facilitate economic growth.
- Chaired professorships and other support for teaching and scholarship required for the recruitment and retention of a top-flight faculty.
- Scholarships to help students meet the rising costs of education, and scholarships to attract students with exceptional professional promise to the school.
- The expansion of the library's collection, and the introduction of new services and new ways of

making the resources of the library accessible to lawyers and judges across the state.


 Enhancements to the building to bring it to the peak of functionality and quiet distinction.

In point of fact, the campaign's \$6 million goal is conservative. The true cost of implementing these new initiatives over the long term will be twice that. But the \$6 million dollar figure is right for the campaign, which extends from now through June 1998. And there is no reason to be intimidated by these figures. As Director of Development and Alumni Affairs Suzanne Livingood reports on p. 11 of this report, lead gifts in the campaign have already given us a significant boost toward our goal.



uring 1993-94, UT served almost 100 students in the two for-credit clinical programs (74 in the Legal Clinic and 24 in the Mediation Program). In addition, members of the faculty (both traditionally clinical and non-clinical) are talking about developing new and varied clinical programs, the Center for Advocacy and Dispute Resolution design is emerging, and plans to hire new faculty with clinical interests are under way. These developments present opportunities to add breadth to UT's clinical offerings, to integrate clinical pedagogy into the curriculum, to integrate more fully the clinical and non-clinical faculty, and to foster more interdisciplinary approaches and connections.

LEGAL CLINIC

The Legal Clinic is the keystone of UT's clinical programs. The 1993-94 goals for the program were:

- to maintaincurricular stability, particularly in the civil clinic:
- to strengthen "firm" management (e.g., office/ case management procedures and personnel issues);
- to evaluate the Homeless Persons Representation Project;
- to address student demand and increase information available to students about the clinic;
- to begin the process of upgrading the computer capability of the clinic (i.e., office management/ case management);
- to begin a process to explore new directions and programs within and without the existing Clinic structure.

The Clinic faculty, students and staff were fairly successful in achieving most of these objectives.

STUDENTS/FACULTY

Seventy-four students completed the Legal Clinic six credit offering in 1993-94. The breakdown by semester was:

 Civil -- 24

During the 1993 fall semester, criminal clinic was heavily over-subscribed (in part because Prof. Gary Anderson was needed to teach evidence). In the '94 spring semester, the criminal and civil clinics were somewhat over-subscribed.

The Clinic operated at a student faculty ratio of 8:1. Faculty teaching in the Clinic were:

Fall 93

Civil: Bunker, Rivkin, Wimberly Criminal: Black

Spring 94

Civil: Blaze, Rivkin, Wimberly Criminal: Black, Anderson

In the civil clinic, students were divided into three practice groups: employment, housing, or homeless. Dean Rivkin supervised the housing group student attorneys, Phyliss Wimberly supervised the homeless group student attorneys, and Kate Bunker (fall) and Doug Blaze (spring) supervised the employment group student attorneys.

The presence of social worker Pam Wolf on the faculty permitted the Clinic to take a more interdisciplinary approach to solving legal problems in all components of the Clinic. Although Pam worked primarily in the homeless component of the civil clinic, she also assisted students and faculty handling criminal, housing, and employment matters.

Through Pam's connections to the College of Social Work, the Clinic also served as a field placement for several bachelor's level social work students. The students (one in the fall and two in the spring), under Pam's supervision, worked with the law student teams to address the social and economic issues underlying many of the legal issues confronting clients. Due to the success of this approach, four social work students (including one at the master's level) will be assigned to the Clinic for the fall 94 semester.

CASELOAD

The Legal Clinic goal is to teach students what it means to be a lawyer and start the process of learning how to lawyer. Using real clients and cases, we have two primary objectives: 1) to have students represent clients (establishing relationships, learning respective roles, assuming profession responsibility, etc.) and 2) help students begin

1993-94 LEGAL CLINIC to develop professional judgment and skills on behalf of those clients. Of course, specific skills training (counseling, negotiation, fact investigation) is a secondary benefit.

The Clinic case selection reflects our pedagogical objectives. The program utilizes primarily (but not exclusively) smaller cases that permit the students to be the principal lawyer. Cases are selected that provide the widest range of lawyering experiences (e.g., interviewing, counseling, fact investigation, negotiation, fact investigation and analysis, legal research, evidence presentation, etc.)

CRIMINAL CASES

The students and faculty in the criminal clinic handled 203 cases during the academic year. 108 were closed; 95 remain open. Most of the cases involved misdemeanor charges or less serious felonies. The types of criminal cases opened were:

Highlights in the miscellaneous category included the successful defense of a bigamy charge and defense of a charge of possession of an unauthorized sign on First Amendment grounds when the client held up a sign warning motorists of a radar trap.

Most of the cases are handled at the General Sessions Court level in Knox and Loudon counties. Each case involves at least one or two court appearances. Students are responsible for all interactions with the client: investigation, plea negotiations, and, if necessary, the preliminary hearing. The Clinic continues to handle some of the cases bound over for jury trial in Circuit Court, although many are picked up by the public defender's office. For example, at least eight cases were scheduled for trial in Circuit Court during the fall of 1994.

CIVIL CASES

The civil clinic handled 235 cases during the past year in three practice areas: employment, housing, and the homeless. 205 were closed; 30 remain open. The types of cases handled were:

Employment	55 (24%)
Housing	81 (34%)
Homeless	94 (40%)
Miscellaneous	5 (2%)

The employment cases involved contested adjudications of entitlement to unemployment benefits. Prior to the hearings, student attorneys conducted fact investigation and legal research. At the hearings before the administrative law judge, students conducted direct examination of witnesses, cross-examination of witnesses, evidentiary objections, and closing argument. In addition, on those rare occasions that the written decision is not in the client's favor, the students handle, if warranted, a written appeal to an administrative review board. Occasionally, the Clinic will pursue judicial review in Chancery Court. In addition, students have evaluated several potential Title VII cases and helped clients initiate the required state and federal administrative process.

Housing cases generally revolve around private tenant/landlord disputes arising under the Uniform Residential Landlord and Tenant Act (URLTA) or claims arising from federally subsidized housing. The cases often involve significant fact investigation and legal research into the governing statutes and regulations. Although cases often require evidentiary presentation in general sessions court and/or formal administrative hearings, the student attorneys also engage in extensive negotiations with opposing counsel. One or two cases a semester are tried in Circuit Court on appeal.

Student attorneys in the homeless practice group handled a wide variety of legal matters ranging from drafting wills to defending efforts to terminate parental rights. For educational reasons, the homeless project has attempted to limit the types of cases to housing, mental health commitment proceedings, public benefits, and social security claims. These cases involve a significant amount of counseling and negotiation but also may include evidentiary development and presentation in administrative and court fora. The Social Security cases have the added benefit of requiring students to deal with expert witnesses.

The civil clinic also continues to handle other pieces of significant litigation when educationally and/or professionally warranted. In one such case, Carver v. Knox County, a case about jail conditions supervised by Dean Rivkin, Judge Jarvis issued an opinion in March awarding the clinic attorney's fees (over \$48,000, although only half was collectible because 50 percent was

apportioned to the State). In the opinion, responding to the county's contention that the Clinic should not be awarded fees, Judge Jarvis wrote:

"[W]e discern no reason why [a] statutory authorization of attorneys' fee award should not encompass student work in law school clinics. Indeed, such allowances may promote the availability of lower-cost representation, with salutary effects on the burden of fee awards, on statutory efforts to remove barriers to litigation of meritorious claims, and on the appropriate forces encouraging settlement in appropriate cases, as well as on the quality of legal education. Absent fee awards at market rates, the opposing party might have an incentive to litigate a case that would otherwise be settled." (Quoting Jordan v. U.S. Dept. of Justice, 691 F.2d 514 (D.C. Cir 1982)

Fees awarded to Mr. Rivkin will go to the U.T. Legal Clinic -- not to Mr. Rivkin personally. This will, of course, insure indigents in need of representation will continue to be ably represented by the UT Legal Clinic.

In fact, Judge Jarvis recently asked the Clinic, through Dean Rivkin, to handle the trial of an interesting §1983 action. However, the Clinic was unable to comply with the request because the primary defendant is the State.

CLASSES

Students in both the criminal and civil divisions have class sessions two to three hours a week. The classes have several specific goals: 1) to teach basic lawyering skills through simulation; 2) to teach and or reinforce relevant substantive law; 3) to examine

ethical and professional dimensions of the students' lawyering; and 4) to assess critically the function of legal institutions and the lawyer's role with respect to those institutions.

Both criminal and civil faculty rely on expert practitioners to supplement their classroom presentations and materials.

OFFICE/PRACTICE MANAGEMENT

Quality office management in the Legal Clinic is important for two reasons. First, as a law firm the Clinic must provide high quality, well-managed representation as a matter of professional responsibility and to limit liability. Second, the Clinic has an opportunity to educate students regarding a well-managed, high-quality practice. To achieve better our potential in this regard, the Clinic has devoted significant attention to revising and reemphasizing office and case management policies and procedures. The effort, however, is a significant challenge in light of the number of student attorneys, regular turnover in student attorneys, and the students' limited experience.

The role of technology in law practice is changing dramatically. Improved technology is the key to 1) the Clinic's (and any law firm's) ability to manage its law practice as effectively as possible and 2) educating students about law practice management. Fortunately, opportunities presented by the transition and a very supportive administration have allowed us to move in that direction this past year. All faculty and staff now have 486 PC's and we are in the process of being networked (thanks to the cooperation of the library). The goal is to have a network system, served by a separate file server, that will serve faculty, staff, and students. The system will include a new word processing system, information/legal research access, an office management system with e-mail, and a case management program including conflicts, calendaring, and a tickler system.



FACULTY ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Dwight Aarons served as a member of the Tennessee Bar Association's Commission on Women and Minorities. He presented "AIDS and Society" as part of a University Studies Course.

Gary L. Anderson served as the College of Law's 1993-94 representative to the AALS House of Representatives. He testified before the Judiciary Committee of the Tennessee General Assembly about a measure that would have preempted the recommendations of the Supreme Court's Post-Conviction Study Committee with respect to the processing of death penalty cases. His testimony helped defeat the measure and ensure that any change in the law in this area will be made as part of a considered judgement of the whole state scheme for postconviction review.

Frances L. Ansley was a program chairman for the annual meeting of the American Society for Legal History in Memphis. She was guest columnist on several occasions for the *Knoxville News-Sentinel* Business Viewpoint. She continued to work for the Tennessee Industrial Renewal Network. She was a panelist

on the program of the Section on Teaching Methods at the Association of American Law Schools annual meeting. She spoke to the UTK chapter of the Society for International Development on the North American Free Trade Agreement. She participated in West Virginia University's Benedum Lecture Series and spoke on fairness in the economy. She attended a meeting of the Task Force on Low-Wage Workers and the Working Poor of the Interuniversity Consortium on Poverty Law. She was initiated into the Phi Kappa Phi honor society at UT. She organized and sponsored an eight-student delegation from UT to attend the Cover Memorial Retreat on Public Interest Law and Practice in New Hampshire.

William J. Beintema continued to compile and process library statistics for the Southeastern region and UT's peer schools. He is also a member of the College of Law Building Committee and continued to use his strong background in computer hardware and software to solve problems within the College.

Reba Best co-authored with Cheryn Picquet a book, Computer Law and Software Protection, which was published by McFarland and Company. She served as the College of Law's representative to the UT Campus Chest campaign and through her efforts the College of Law surpassed its goal of \$12,500. She was the College of Law's representative to the UT Faculty Senate.

Jerry P. Black, Jr. was a judge for the ATLA, Labor, Constitutional Law, and National Moot Court teams. He also served as faculty advisor for UT's student chapter of the National Association of Criminal Defense Attorneys. He counseled, pro bono, several indigents in criminal cases and was co-counsel for an inmate on death row as part of an ABA Postconviction Death Penalty Representation Project.

Doug Blaze served as a member of the Knoxville Bar Association's 2000 Committee. He is a member of the Board of Directors of the Knoxville Legal Aid Society and was appointed as a member of the Tennessee Bar Association Pro Bono Committee.

Kelly Browne served as editor for the new Law Library publication, *Inter Alia*. She also taught a class for law students who were preparing for summer clerkships.

Kate Bunker attended the Interuniversity Consortium on Poverty Law at the University of Wisconsin and led a discussion on teaching poverty law. She taught a new course on poverty law at UT. She prepared and updated an *Unemployment Compensation Law Resource Manual* for use by civil advocacy students who represent clients through the Legal Clinic.

Neil P. Cohen continued to work with the Tennessee Sentencing Commission in Nashville. He was coach of UT's Evidence Moot Court Team, which finished first in national competition. He helped to raise funds and select works for the College of Law's art collection, most notably the Tennessee Courthouse Collection. He appeared as an "expert" commentator on several news programs involving criminal justice issues.

Joseph G. Cook produced annual supplements to Constitutional Rights of the Accused and Civil Rights Actions. He was faculty advisor to UT's National Moot Court Team and the Moot Court Board and was a judge and counselor for most interand intramural appellate teams. He was a panel member for Ethics & Professionalism in Criminal Litigation, a CLE program

sponsored by the Tennessee Association of Criminal Defense Lawyers and the Knoxville Defense Lawyers Association.



Judy M. Cornett Received President's Award from the Knoxville Bar Association

Judy M. Cornett presented a paper, "The Eighteenth-Century Law of Evidence: Chief Baron Gilbert, John Locke, and Samuel Richardson's Clarissa," as a member of the panel on "Legal History, Literary History: Eighteenth Century Intersections" at the annual meeting of the American Society for Legal History in Memphis. She received a President's Award from the Knoxville Bar Association for her work with the Professionalism Committee. She presented a paper titled "The World Within' Meets'The World Without:' Epistemology in The Mysteries of Udolpho" at the American Society for Eighteenth Century Studies annual meeting. She participated in a roundtable discussion following the University of Cincinnati Law School's Robert S. Marx lecture.

Thomas Y. Davies was active in organizing the proposed Entrepreneurial Law Center. He also served on the UT Faculty Senate and Faculty Senate Executive Committee. He was a judge for several moot court practice rounds and competitions and

reviewed several manuscripts for the Tennessee Law Review.

Larry Dessem had an article titled "Judicial Reporting Under the Civil Justice Reform Act" published in the University of Pittsburgh Law Review. He spoke about the Civil Justice Reform Act at a Chattanooga Bar Association Bench/Bar Conference. He presented a program about the work of the Tennessee Supreme Court Commission on Dispute Resolution at a meeting of the Mediation Association of Knoxville. He served as chairman of UT's internal review team in connection with the Academic Program Review conducted by the College of Social Work. He served as a member of the executive committee of the Association of American Law Schools Civil Procedure Section for 1994. He spoke at a CLE program sponsored by the Knoxville Bar Association on alternative dispute resolution. He was the speaker at a Tennessee Bar Association program on federal practice. He was elected to the American Law Institute. He became a consultant to the Advisory Commission to the Tennessee Supreme Court on Civil Procedure.

Grayfred Gray co-chaired the Knoxville Bar Association's Alternative Dispute Resolution Committee. Prof. Gray started the UT Mediation Clinic in August 1993. He planned and taught three training programs for the Knoxville Bar Association Mediation Service. He wrote the Mediation Manual for Knox County General Sessions Court that was used in 1993-94. He co-presented a program on the Mediation Clinic and mediation to the UT System Chief Academic Officers meeting. He led a workshop on "ConflictResolution: Why Don't They Just Learn the Rules" for 30 school teachers, principals and superintendents at the annual

conference of the Public Schools for Cooperative Research in Athens, Tenn. He had an article, "Legal Expert System Building: A Semi-Intelligent Computer Program Makes It Easier," published in The John Marshall Law School Journal of Computer and Information Law.

Patrick Hardin served as chairman of the College of Law Building Committee and led the College through the preliminary stages leading up to ground-breaking for the new building in September 1994. He assisted with the first annual supplement to *The Developing Labor Law*, 3d ed., of which he is Editor in Chief. He lectured on "AIDS and Employment Law" to the undergraduate honors special course on AIDS and Society in November 1993.

Amy Hess received the 1993 Harold C. Warner Outstanding Teacher Award and was also named one of the University of Tennessee National Alumni Association's Outstanding Teachers for 1994. She was chosen for her professional image as well as her teaching. She received the award at the Chancellor's Honors Banquet. Prof. Hess was asked to author the multi-volume treatise Bogert on Trusts and Trustees, published by West Publishing Company. She was co-coach of UT's 1994 National Tax Moot Court team, which finished second in competition at St. Petersburg, Fla., in January 1994.

Mary Jo Hoover received the University of Tennessee Teaching Council and Student Government Association Award for Excellence in Advising. She received the award at the Chancellor's Honors Banquet. She also serves as chairman of the Transition Committee while the new law building is being constructed and the existing building is being renovated.

Joseph H. King, Jr. had two articles published in *A Torts Anthology* by Levine, Davies, and Kionka. Frederick S. Le Clercq was a member of a UT group which spent a month in France during the spring of 1994. He visited French courts and libraries and met with members of the French bench and bar. He is working in an ad hoc effort to increase the contacts between the UT College of Law and the law school at the University of Bonn (Germany).

Robert M. Lloyd served as a member of the University of Tennessee's Distance Education Advisory Committee as part of the Continuing Education Program. He spoke at the inaugural meeting of the Tennessee Legislature's Uniform Commercial Code Study Committee. He was elected to membership in the American College of Commercial Finance Lawyers.

Cooley Law School. His lecture was titled "Law as Ornamentation" and was published in the Thomas M. Cooley Law Review. He received a UT Faculty Grant to study German at the Goethe Institute in Germany. He served as 1994 chairman of the Association of American Law Schools Tort and Compensation Systems Section. He had an article, "Comments on Van Ballegooijen v. Bayer Nederland from an American Perspective," published in Consumer Law Journal.

Cheryn Picquet was editor of the newsletter of the East Tennessee Lawyers Association for Women. In 1993 she co-authored with Reba Best a book, Computer Law and Software Protection, which was published by McFarland and Company. She served as a member of the University Faculty Senate Library Committee.







Carl Pierce received a Carden Award for Outstanding Institutional Service in 1993. He served as chairperson of UTK's Residency Classification Appeals Committee. He served as chairperson of the Academic Standards and Curriculum Committee and prepared a major study of grading at the College of Law. He spoke on "The Practice of Corporate Law" to UT undergraduate business majors as part of an Executive Undergraduates Workshop series in the College of Business Administration. He presented "The Special Professional Responsibilities of the Corporate Counsel" at the Second Annual Tennessee Corporate Counsel Institute. He served on the advisory board for the Tennessee Ethics Handbook.

Glenn H. Reynolds testified before U.S. Congress' Committee on Science, Space and Technology. The topic was "Status of Space Commercialization." He had an article titled "Legal Problems of Nanotechnology: An Overview" published in the Southern California Disciplinary Law Journal. He had a paper, "Space Commercialization: Problems of Law and Policy," included in the proceedings of the Space 94 Conference. He was a member of a panel that discussed "The Religious Right vs. Civil Rights: How the Religious Right is Threatening Our Liberties." The panel was sponsored by the Knoxville and Oak Ridge chapters of the American Civil Liberties Union of Tennessee. He presented "Is Democracy Like Sex" as part of the Knoxville Bar Association's Constitutional Law Forum series. He attended the National Space Society's Reinventing NASA Conference at George Washington University. He wrote "Framers' intent: Second Amendment being rediscovered in debate over gun

control" for the *Knoxville News-Sentinel*. He delivered a presentation on government procurement reform as part of a panel on Reinventing NASA at the 1994 International Space Development Conference in Toronto. He was co-author of an amicus brief before the U.S. Supreme Court in the case of *Lopez v. United States*.



Dean H. Rivkin Appointed as public representative for the Southern Appalachian Mountain Initiative

Dean H. Rivkin spent 10 days in Bolivia consulting with the U.S. Administration of Justice Project. While in Bolivia, Rivkin also met with the staff of the then PLAN international office. PLAN is a nongovernmental organization that assists children and communities in Bolivia and other countries. He was appointed by the National Park Service to serve as a public representative on a new federal-state program, the Southern Appalachian Mountain Initiative (SAMI). SAMI will attempt to develop strategies for combating the continuing adverse effects of air pollution on national parks in the Southeast. He continued to be an advocate for children as he spoke on changes in Tennessee's foster care system. He made a presentation at the annual meeting of the Tennessee Association of School

Psychologists. The topic was "The Dynamics of Special Education Law and Advocacy." He had an article, "Doing Environmental Justice in Appalachia: Lawyers at the Grass Roots and Aspirations of Social Change," published in Vol. 96 of the West Virginia Law Review, 1109.

John Sobieski served as chair of the Faculty Campaign Committee during the capital campaign. He was also co-chairman of the Faculty Appointments Committee and helped produce the annual supplements to Constitutional Rights of the Accused and Civil Rights Actions. He helped with the Tax, Evidence, Constitutional Law and Labor Law Moot Court teams.

Barbara Stark had an article, "PostModern Rhetoric, Economic Rights and an International Text: 'A Miracle for Breakfast," published in the Virginia Journal of International Law. She met with 18 Junior Fellows from the New York University Center for International Studies to discuss "The Law of International Organizations in Situations of Civil War." She served as one of seven members on a new advisory committee that will disseminate information and promote awareness of selected U.N.-sponsored world conferences over the next two years. She received a UT Faculty Grant to study women's rights in Scandinavia. She was a panelist at the TAEHA/THEA Conference in Knoxville. She was on the "Family and the Law" panel and spoke on "Using Family Law to 'Help' Families: If the Cure Doesn't Kill You."

Greg Stein had an op-ed piece, "Laws Made To Be Broken," published in *The Washington Post*. He presented a workshop on "What Lawyers Do: Litigation, Transactions, and Justice" as part of the UT College of Business Administration Executive Undergraduate Workshop. He served as vice-chair of the Legal Education Committee of the American Bar Association's Real Property, Probate and Trust Law Section.

James E. Thompson continued on academic leave. He is pursuing a graduate degree through the U.S. Air Force that will be followed by a tour of duty with special responsibilities in environmental law.

Steven R. Thorpe was a speaker at the Southeastern Chapter of the American Association of Law Libraries annual meeting in Charleston, W.Va. A program he conceived and planned was presented at the American Association of Law Libraries annual meeting. During the fall of 1993 he made a presentation at the Knoxville Bar Association's Legal Expo. Hehas been admitted as a member of the U.S. Court of Veterans Appeals.

Barry M. Wertheimer served as a member of the Academic Standards and Curriculum Committee and the Admissions Committee. He also served on the Readmissions Committee. He taught courses in securities regulation and advanced business associations.

Pamela L. Wolf worked with the Homeless Persons Representation Project as a social worker and instructor to third-year law students taking civil clinic. She served as chair of the Advocacy Committee for the Coalition for the Homeless in Knoxville. She is also a member of the Tennessee Commission on Social Welfare and the Knox Housing Partnership Board. In addition to her responsibilities in the College of Law, Prof. Wolf is a field representative for the UT College of Social Work.

FACULTY GIFTS

The University of Tennessee announced in October 1994 the 21st Century Campaign, a major capital campaign. The College of Law is a part of that campaign.

Planning for the campaign began in earnest during the summer of 1992. The Dean and the faculty spent considerable time discussing and setting priorities for the future of legal education at UT. The plans are ambitious ones. The amount of money needed to fund these initiatives is a significant sum.

The faculty decided that before they could ask the alumni of the College of Law to support the school in a way the alums had never been asked before, they needed to make their own commitments.

In the fall of 1993, John Sobieski chaired a faculty gifts committee. Other members of that committee were Jerry Black, Carl Pierce, and Cheryn Picquet. They designed a faculty gifts program and solicited every faculty member with the goal of 100% participation and 2% of annual salary for each of five years. Both goals were surpassed. Not only did one hundred percent of the faculty participate, but two new faculty members also made pledges. The total commitment from 30 faculty members is \$260,150.







THE LAW LIBRARY



ecause the Law Library has benefitted over the past several years from bud-

getary increases in the areas of collection development, staffing, and technology, we have finally gained the ability to function as a bridge-builder within the College of Law, the University, the legal community, the local community, and the state of Tennessee. The Law Library serves the College of Law students and faculty as their primary research facility. It is also the major source of legal information for the University and for the bench and bar of the state. The information in the library comes in many formats, including the traditional books and journals, microforms, audio-visuals, and electronic formats such as on-line and cd-rom computer databases.

Collection development funding for the library has again increased by 22 percent, allowing the library to provide materials which were budgetarily out-of-reach in the past. The topical scope of the library has been broadened, and practice-oriented materials have been allocated greater priority, bridging information gaps between the primary interests of the college, the campus, the bench and bar, and the community. Funding has also been provided


for additional technology needed to access information in new electronic formats. Funding of this type is being used to implement projects such as the development of cd-rom tower systems which will be an exciting addition to the new computer lab network as it is established. Creating yet another information bridge, this system will provide user access to a variety of new databases including Tennessee Law on Disk, Legal-Trac, and Index to Legal Periodicals.


The five-year comparison chart illustrates current collection growth and acquisition expenditures. The Law Library now contains 383,248 volumes and microform volume equivalents. This is a 4.6 percent increase over the past year and a 21.6 percent increase over the past five years.

Funding increases for faculty/staff development have also allowed the library to expand into higher levels of service provision. Two new positions, noted in last year's annual report, have been filled during the year. The first, a cataloger, will shorten the time needed to classify, catalog, and process materials for the collection as well as participate in the establishment and implementation of the on-line catalog. The second position, a computer services and network manager, is instrumental in the crucial planning and implementation stages of the electronic library which will allow the library to connect the present to the future via the bridge of information technology.

Probably the most significant bridge now "under construction" in the library is the on-line automated catalog. Through recent funding and with approval by the University administration, the library is now prepared to move ahead with the conversion of the card catalog to an automated database format. This project will eventually allow library users to access information on holdings in the collection and their circulation status. Access will be available via personal computer to both the university community and the broader community.

The Law Library is indeed on the threshold of a new "building program." Because of the exciting technological changes occurring in the methods used to provide legal information services, the library can envision vast opportunities for establishing links with its users and potential users. The new structural building addition will provide the space and technical support necessary to implement such changes. The faculty and staff have devoted much time, energy, and talentoverseveral years to the planning process for the new facility. Similar commitments are also being made to planning the technological structure which will allow the construction of further connector bridges such as the on-line catalog, creating the potential to make our information world smaller and more responsive to our needs.





CAREER SERVICES

areer Services is building for the future by continuing to shift its emphasis from the role of "job brokers" (providing notices of job listings and on-campus interviewing opportunities) to equally one of "educator" regarding the versatility of the law degree and the many professional arenas in which it may be used. Several new projects undertaken in during 1993-94 focused on efforts to help students discover what they would like to do with their J.D. degree and how to make contacts and build networks for doing so.

The office sponsored an information fair on non-traditional legal careers and invited local practitioners to speak with students one-on-one at booths placed around the law school. Participants included public defenders, district attorneys, mediators, corporate in-house attorneys, entrepreneurs, public interest attorneys, environmental regulators, and a U.S. Senator's field director, among others.

Along with the seven other Mid-South Law Placement Consortium schools, Career Services co-sponsored a workshop in Nashville featuring attorney Deborah Arron, author of What Can You Do With a Law Degree? A Lawyers Guide to Career Alternatives Inside, Outside and Around the Law and Running from the Law: Why Good Lawyers Are Getting Out of the Legal Profession. A number of UT students and alumni were among the more than 130 attorneys who attended the seminar to learn about realistic options for people with law degrees, transferable skills, and strategies for finding career satisfaction.

Lawyers of the Present, the first in a series of booklets highlighting the careers of UT law alumni, was published. Forty-one alumni participated in the first edition, dedicated to alternative careers in which J.D. degrees were used in non-legal or law-related roles. Participants submitted narratives describing their career paths since graduation, the satisfactions and frustrations of their work, and advice for students contemplating a similar career. Many participants gave students the same advice-"get a law degree, then do anything you want."

The second edition of *Lawyers of the Present* will highlight alumni in law firms and corporate counsel positions, and the third edition will focus on alumni in government and public interest positions. Both volumes will be published in 1995.

Continuing the response to a national trend in legal recruiting in which employers are cutting back on the number of law school campuses they visit and off-campus job conferences they attend, the Career Services staff stressed the necessity for students to take themselves to employers. To assist them in targeting prospective employers, information from Career Services' administrative files was computerized, giving students the recruiting histories of more than 900 employers. The database includes the name of the firm, government agency, corporation or public interest organization; the address, phone number and contact person; primary practice areas; and the last date of interaction with Career Services. Students can obtain a copy of all or parts of the database (on paper or computer disk) for use in direct mail campaigns.

The Career Services Committee of the Alumni Advisory Council co-sponsored a project to build a network of alumni willing to give several hours a yearby phone or personal interview to assist graduates in the transition from academics to the practice of law. More than 100 Alumni Networkers are now available to advise students on their particular areas of practice and on employment opportunities in their cities and states.

During the school year, members of the Barristers Division of the Knoxville Bar Association presented seminars on aspects of practice they wish they had known about when they graduated. Topics included starting your own business, selecting clients, case management, how to check conflicts, attorney professional liability, discrimination issues, mediation, bankruptcy, ERISA, tax and tax litigation, and a panel on pro bono work.

New books and videos were added to the resource library, including JD Preferred: 400+ Things You Can Do With A Law Degree; The Last Frontier: Women Attorneys As Rainmakers; It's Who You Know: Career Strategies for Making Effective Personal Contacts; and Turning Points: New Paths and Second Careers for Lawyers.

EMPLOYMENT STATISTICS FOR THE CLASS OF 1993

The annual employment survey compiled by the Career Services Office for the National Association for Law Placement (NALP) showed little change in overall employment rates and salaries for UT graduates from 1992 to 1993. This trend of general stability

also was documented in NALP's official national report, Class of 1993: Employment Report and Salary Survey.*

The most noticeable changes for UT graduates included:

- the number entering private practice -- 72 percent of the Class of 1993, compared to 64 percent of the Class of 1992;
- the number remaining in Knoxville after graduation -- 36 percent of the Class of 1993, compared to 25 percent of the Class of 1992;
- and the continuing decline of students accepting employment out-of-state -- 14 percent of the Class of 1993, compared to 21 percent of the Class of 1992.

Within nine months of graduation, 90 percent of the Class of 1993 whose employment status was known had accepted employment, compared to 91 percent of the Class of 1992. Eighty-three percent of law school graduates nationwide in the Class of 1993 had accepted employment during the same period, compared to almost 84 percent of the Class of 1992.

Ten percent of UT's Class of 1993 reported that they were unemployed and seeking work, unchanged from 10 percent for the previous year. Thirteen percent of law school graduates nationwide reported being unemployed and seeking work.

Seventy-two percent of employed graduates chose to enter private practice, compared to 57 percent nationwide. Of those entering private practice, 63 percent were employed with small firms of 2-10 attorneys; only 36 percent of graduates nationwide worked in the same size firm. Seventeen percent of UT's graduates accepted employment in government-related positions, nine percent in business and industry, and one percent each in public interest and academic fields.

Fifty-two percent of graduates employed full-time provided salary information, revealing a range of \$18,000 to \$65,000. The average annual salary of \$36,474 reported for all locations and all employment categories was down slightly from \$37,675 for the Class of 1992. This compares to a nationwide, average annual salary of \$43,200 for the Class of 1992, up from \$42,600 for the previous year.






